- A: Working with the local media (Shana Penn)
 The media workshop is geared to local chapter needs. Topics to be discussed include: 1) Media relations in support of chapter activities and goals; 2)
 Monitoring local mainstream and Jewish media; 3) Coordinating media work with national spokespersons and national media committee.
- B: Fundraising at the local level (Meredith Tax)
 Learn about community funds, progressive donors, and individual solicitations to raise funds for our work. This session will include a practice component.
- C: Chapter development (Cherie Brown)
 Discuss chapter development issues -- for people in areas with small Jewish populations and/or those who are just starting up chapters.
- D: Conflict Resolution, Part 3: Exploring individual scenarios using the skills taught in the morning (Lara Weitzman)
 Take your conflict management skills to the next level. Bring actual situations you have experienced or heard about and get help finding solutions. This hands-on workshop will answer tough questions and provide practice time, building on skills presented in earlier workshops.
- E: For every season and every Jew: Exploring the "Jewish" aspect of the Jewish Alliance for Justice and Peace (Tamara Cohen and Rabbi Rebecca Lillian)
 Discuss outreach to various groups of religiously and spiritually identified

Jews. Learn how to integrate the Jewish holidays into Brit Tzedek events and use the themes of the holidays to further our mission and build membership. Discuss how to address issues of religious diversity at Brit Tzedek events.
